LATEST ADVICE AND MEASURES IN BRITISH COLUMBIA

- Today, the BC Government announced that the Province is updating provincial requirements to ease the current visitor restrictions for long-term care homes and seniors’ assisted living residences.⁵
 - The update to the provincial requirements will be monitored throughout July and will allow:
 - Visitation in individual facilities to resume once the facility has developed the required safety plan.
 - Residents to have one designated visitor in appropriate designated spaces, subject to appropriate face masks being worn.
 - Additionally, the Province is investing in a suite of initiatives to protect long-term care and seniors’ assisted-living residents from COVID-19, as facilities begin allowing visitors. This investment will provide:
 - More than \$160 million for facilities to hire up to three full-time equivalent staff in each of BC’s 680 long-term care homes
 - \$26.5 million for facilities to address costs incurred between March 1 and June 30, 2020

LATEST ADVICE AND MEASURES IN YUKON TERRITORY

- Today the Yukon Government released additional information regarding Phase 2 of Yukon's plan for safely lifting COVID-19 public health measures that begins July 1, 2020.⁶
 - Residents of Yukon, British Columbia, Northwest Territories and Nunavut can enter Yukon without having to self-isolate subject to proof of valid identification proving residence.
 - Yukon's border will open to the rest of Canada but with strict public health measures, including the need to self-isolate for 14-days unless exempt from this requirement.
 - Enforcement officers will continue to be stationed at Yukon border checkpoints to advise travelers of the obligation to self-isolate and provide information on how to safely transit through the Yukon.
- Today, the Yukon Government announced that effective July 1, 2020, individuals entering all Yukon airports will be required to wear a non-medical mask or face covering.⁷
 - As travel restrictions begin to lift, an increase in airport traffic is anticipated and these additional protective measures will help slow the spread of COVID-19 and ensure passengers and airport staff maintain the same level of safety.

Whitehorse

- No significant updates from the city of Whitehorse.

Watson Lake

- No COVID-19 information for this community is currently available.

LATEST ADVICE AND MEASURES FROM THE GOVERNMENT OF CANADA

- Today, the Canada Border Services Agency (CBSA) released a reminder that travel restrictions are still in place at all Canadian international border crossings and will be in place until at least July 21, 2020.⁸ The travel restrictions include:
 - All travel of an optional or discretionary nature of foreign nationals, including tourism, recreation and entertainment, across all ports of entry in all modes of transportation.
 - Foreign nationals, including US citizens, will not be allowed to enter Canada for any of the following examples of discretionary travel:
 - Opening or checking on a cottage or seasonal home.
 - Sightseeing.
 - Boating across the border.
 - Fishing or hunting.
 - Visiting friends or a girlfriend, boyfriend or fiancé.

- Asymptomatic immediate family members of Canadian citizens and permanent residents who are coming to Canada for a minimum of 15 days will be exempt from the prohibition from entering Canada for a discretionary purpose.
