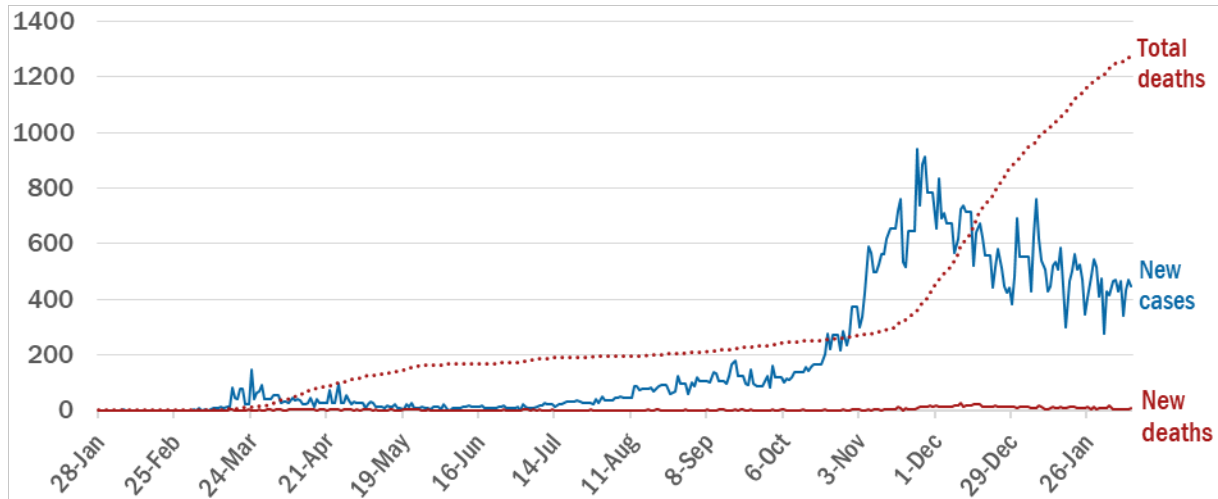

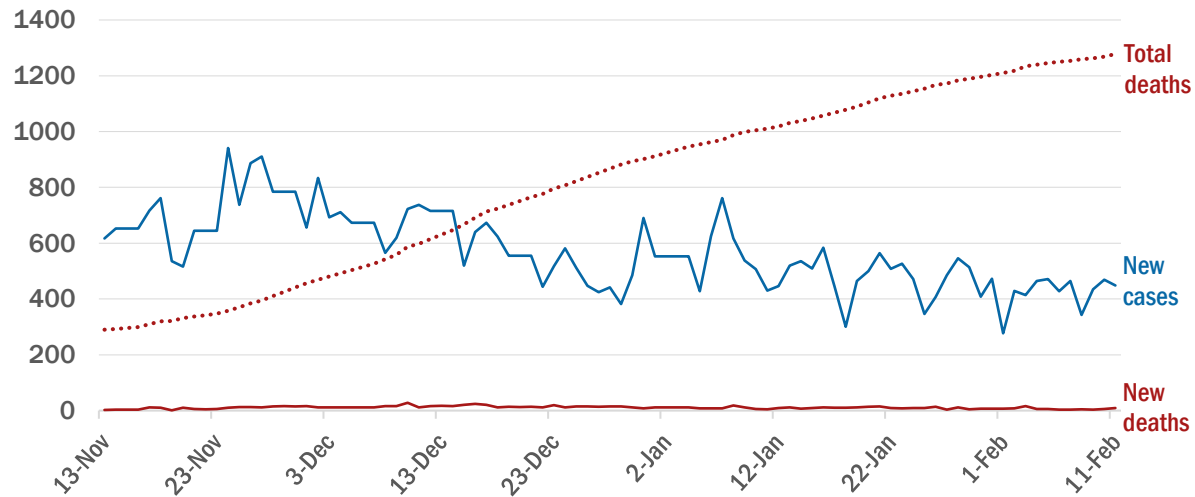

COVID-19 CASES AND DEATHS IN BC – PAST THREE MONTHS



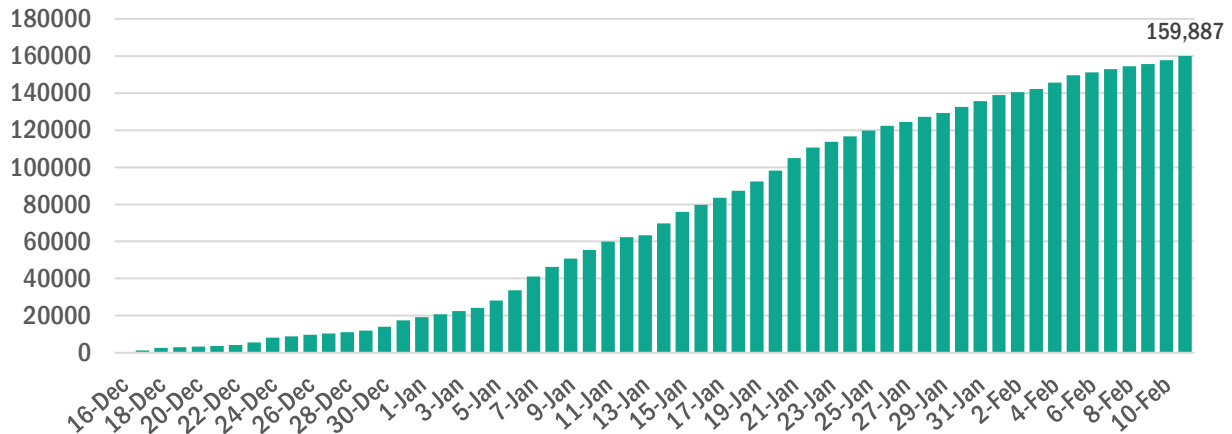

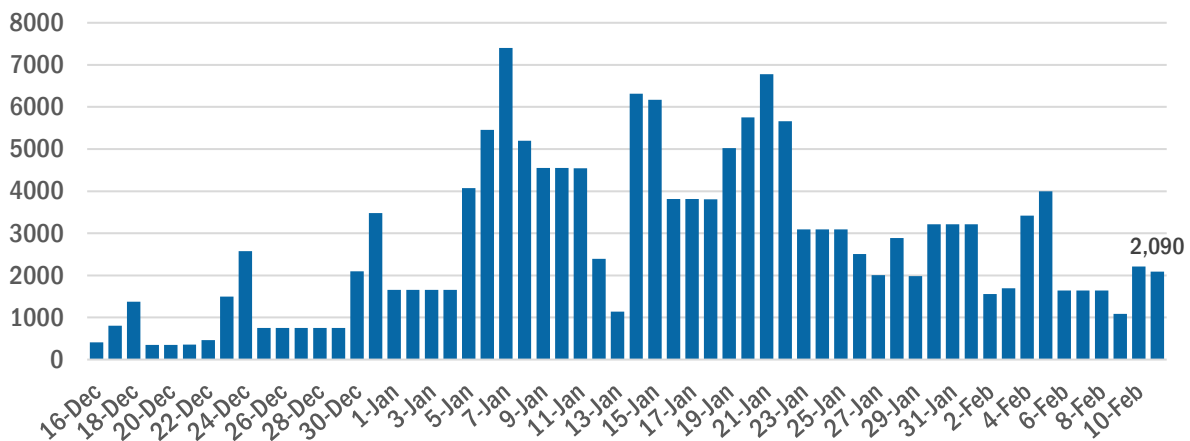

SIGNIFICANT UPDATES IN THE YUKON TERRITORY

- Today, Premier Sandy Silver and Dr. Brendan Hanley, Yukon’s Chief Medical Officer of Health, provided an update on the territory’s ongoing response to the COVID-19 pandemic. Highlights include the following:⁸
 - There have been no active cases of COVID-19 in the territory for the past four weeks.
 - New vaccine shipments have arrived in the past weekend:
 - Long term care residents and high-risk health care workers will be receiving their second doses.
 - Bookings for a second dose will open soon both online, and by phone. Visit <https://yukon.ca/en/this-is-our-shot> for more information.
 - Many people will notice more effects of the second doses than the first, especially those younger than 65 years of age. This is a common side effect and a sign that the immune system is “responding as planned”.
 - Side effects may include soreness, swelling at the injection site, slight fever, muscle aches, fatigue, and/or headache.
 - Symptoms and severity of side effects can vary from person to person. Those who are not feeling well after vaccination may elect to stay home and rest.

SIGNIFICANT UPDATES FROM THE GOVERNMENT OF CANADA

- Today, Major-General Dany Fortin, the Vice President of Logistics and Operations at the Public Health Agency of Canada, Dr. Howard Njoo, Canada’s Deputy Chief Public Health Officer, Dr. Tom Wong, Chief Medical Officer of Public Health for Indigenous Services Canada, and Arianne Reza, Assistant Deputy Minister at Public Services and Procurement Canada, provided an update on Canada’s distribution of COVID-19 vaccines:⁹
 - As of today, more than 1,153,000 vaccine doses have been administered in Canada, with 2.4% of Canadians receiving at least one dose of the vaccine and 0.5% completing the required two doses.
 - More than 50% of priority health care workers and more than 50% of senior residents in congregate living settings have received their first dose.
 - Pfizer-BioNTech has indicated that Canada will receive approximately 403,000 doses next week and 475,000 doses in the last week of February.
 - In March, the government anticipates receiving 444,000 doses weekly for the first two weeks. The new shipments will allow for increased administering of 6 doses per vial.
 - Canada is still on track to receive 4 million doses by the end of the month.

- The next Moderna shipment will arrive in the week of February 22, 2021, and contains 168,000 doses.
- As of February 8, 2021, over 72,000 doses have been administered in 344 First Nations, Inuit, and territorial communities.
- Today, Maryam Monsef, Minister for Women and Gender Equality and Rural Economic Development, launched a new \$100 million “Feminist Response and Recovery Fund” for projects that increase women and girls’ participation in Canada’s economic, social, democratic and political life.¹⁰
 - “The COVID-19 pandemic has magnified systemic and longstanding inequalities, with women and girls disproportionately affected by the crisis.”
 - “Eligible projects will tackle barriers, address harmful gender norms and attitudes, or improve policies, practices, resource distribution, networks and relationships.”
 - The women’s program provides funding to eligible organizations in three priority areas:
 - Ending violence against women and girls
 - Improving women’s and girls’ economic security and prosperity
 - Encouraging women and girls in leadership and decision-making roles
