







SIGNIFICANT UPDATES IN BRITISH COLUMBIA

- Today, Dr. Bonnie Henry, B.C.'s provincial health officer, and Adrian Dix, Minister of Health, provided a joint statement regarding updates on the COVID-19 response in B.C.⁶ Highlights include the following:
 - “While cases continue to come down, we still have new cases from community transmission every day. That is why, whether you live in the North, on the Coast, or in the Interior, we strongly encourage everyone to get fully vaccinated as soon as you are eligible.”
 - “We are progressing well, and we need to keep going. For every person who gets vaccinated, it will allow us to gradually transition and safely reopen many things that have been on hold. Our approach in B.C. will continue to be a ‘dimmer switch’ instead of a ‘light switch’ approach.”

SIGNIFICANT UPDATES FROM THE GOVERNMENT OF CANADA

- Today, the Government of Canada provided the following COVID-19 update for Indigenous Peoples and communities:⁷
 - “As of June 22, 2021, over 77% of individuals aged 12 and older have received at least one dose of a COVID-19 vaccine in First Nations, Inuit, and territorial communities. Of this group, over 49% have received their second dose.”
 - “Despite many challenges throughout the pandemic, it is important to recognize the resilience and hard work of Indigenous communities in Canada. While the vaccine results are encouraging, Indigenous communities are making decisions based on ensuring the health and well-being of their community members, recognizing the need for continued vigilance as outbreaks continue to occur.”
 - “Indigenous leadership, including the guidance offered by Elders and Knowledge Keepers, has been central in promoting vaccine confidence, encouraging community members to get vaccinated, and ensuring that people have the information and resources needed to stay healthy and combat COVID-19.”
- Today, the Government of Canada announced the launch of the \$500 million Canada Community Revitalization Fund (CCRF) to drive post-COVID-19 recovery by investing in shared public spaces.⁸
 - “The Government of Canada recognizes that Canadian cities and towns flourish when they have community infrastructure to promote social interaction and physical activity and provide access to recreational programs and facilities. These are integral to our overall well-being as individuals, families and communities.”
 - **About the Fund**
 - The CCRF provides \$500 million over two years to Canada’s regional development agencies (RDAs) to invest in shared and inclusive public spaces, helping to create the

conditions and accessibility to stimulate local economies and bring Canadians back together once it is safe to do so.

- The Fund’s purpose is to support not-for-profit organizations, municipalities, and other community groups, as well as Indigenous communities:
 - Build new community infrastructure and revitalize existing assets
 - Bring people back to public spaces safely as health measures ease
 - Create jobs and stimulate local economies
- **Eligibility**
 - Eligible applicants
 - Not-for-profit organizations or charities
 - Indigenous-led not-for-profits and organizations
 - Under the Fund, RDAs can contribute up to 100% funding for projects with Indigenous groups
 - Any municipal or regional government, or bodies providing infrastructure services to communities (e.g., municipalities, rural communities, local service districts, public-sector bodies)
 - Note: Individuals, businesses and provincial or territorial governments are *not* eligible to apply to the CCRF
 - Eligible projects will be prioritized in the following order:
 - Revitalize downtown cores and main streets
 - Reinvent outdoor spaces
 - Create green infrastructure
 - Increase the accessibility of community spaces
- **Applying for the Fund**
 - Applications are open as of today, June 23, 2021
 - Intake Streams:
 - **Scheduled intake:**

A one-time special scheduled intake will focus on eligible projects that are ready to proceed. Assessment of applications will begin on July 23, 2021, 11:59 pm MDT. Applicants are strongly encouraged to submit their applications by this date.
 - **Continuous intake:**

Should there be remaining funding after the scheduled intake period, applications will continue to be accepted and funded on a continuous intake basis over the next two years or until such a time as the allocated funding is fully distributed.
