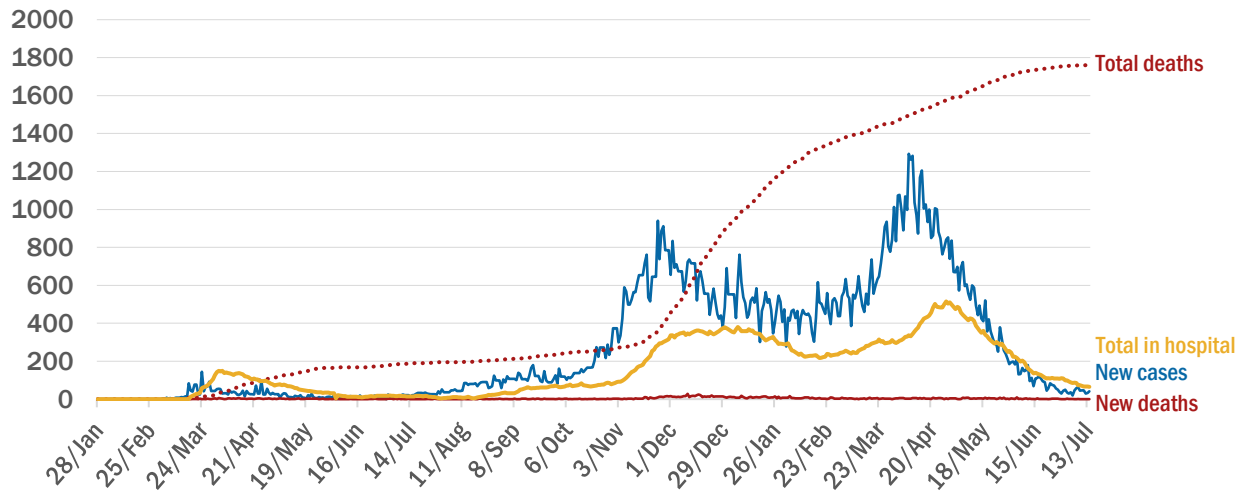

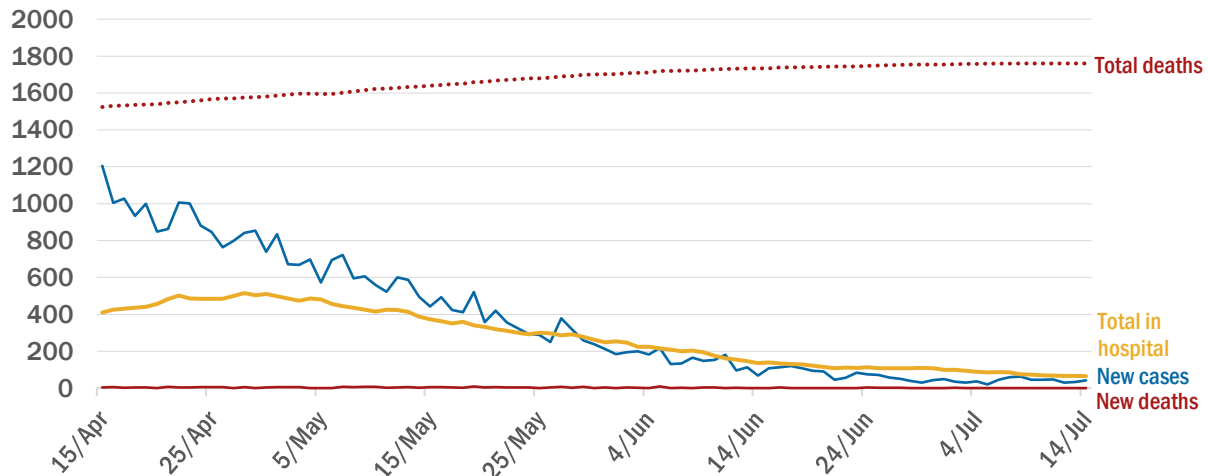

COVID-19 CASES AND DEATHS IN BC – PAST THREE MONTHS



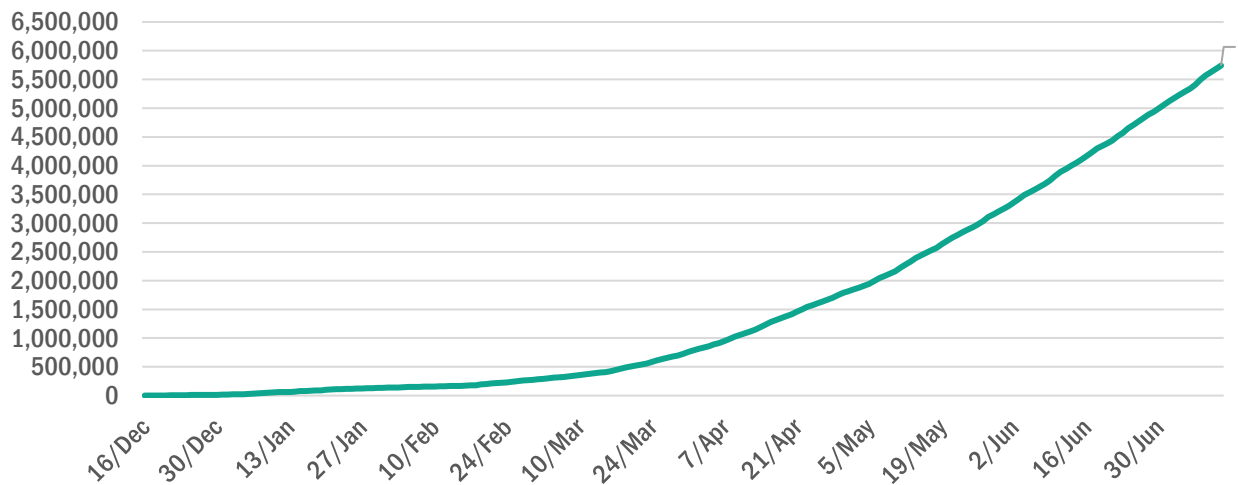

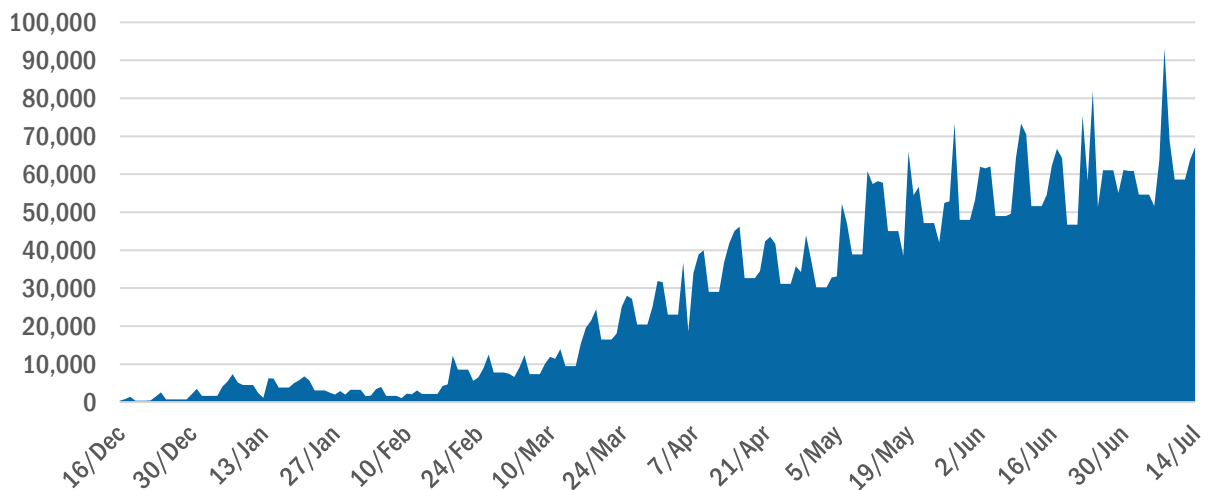

SIGNIFICANT UPDATES IN THE YUKON TERRITORY

- Today, Yukon's Chief Medical Officer of Health (CMOH) Dr. Brendan Hanley is reporting six new confirmed cases of COVID-19 between 12 p.m. Tuesday, July 13, and 12 p.m. today.
 - Of these cases:
 - 5 are located in Whitehorse
 - 1 is in a rural community
 - The CMOH is advising that as of Monday, July 19, daycares and day homes can welcome back all children and not just those of essential and critical workers.
 - This is due to the daycare outbreak now considered under control and most cases recovered.
 - Child care workers are still required to wear a mask.
 - In addition, based on risk and where risk has been identified, sizes for organized gatherings may return to the May 25, 2021, levels of 200 indoors and 200 outdoors provided physical distancing is maintained and masks are worn indoors.
 - Sizes for informal social gatherings may return to limits of 20 indoors and 50 outdoors if everyone is vaccinated.
 - At events where individuals are unvaccinated, the CMOH is still recommending that participants "stick to six".

- On July 13, Yukon's CMOH Dr. Brendan Hanley reported four new cases of COVID-19.⁶
 - Of these cases:
 - 3 are located in Whitehorse
 - 1 is in a rural community
 - All are Yukoners
 - A public exposure notice has been issued for:
 - the Casa Loma Bar on Monday, July 5, 2021, between 6:30 p.m. and closing.
 - Anyone who was at this location at this time should self-monitor and seek testing if they become symptomatic for COVID-19.

SIGNIFICANT UPDATES IN BRITISH COLUMBIA

- Today the B.C. Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure announced more than \$11 million in transportation investment funding for northern BC to support the region during the COVID-19 pandemic:⁷
 - This funding includes more than 30 completed projects ranging from active transportation improvements and transportation upgrades in rural and remote communities, to climate adaptation projects.

SIGNIFICANT UPDATES FROM THE GOVERNMENT OF CANADA

- Today Indigenous Services Canada provided a statement which included the following highlights:⁸
 - As of July 13, 2021, in First Nations communities with available information, over 75% of individuals aged 18 and older have received at least one dose of a COVID-19 vaccine, and over 56% have received two doses.
 - As of July 13, 2021, over 81% of individuals aged 12 and older have received at least one dose of a COVID-19 vaccine in First Nations, Inuit and territorial communities.
 - Of this group, over 57% have received their second dose.
 - Indigenous Peoples aged 12 and older are currently eligible to register for their first vaccine dose.
 - ISC is working with other federal departments to respond to the request for assistance from the Government of Yukon.
 - The department has reached out to the Council of Yukon First Nations to determine whether First Nations communities have any specific needs that could be supported by the Indigenous Communities Support Fund.
- Today, Chrystia Freeland, Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Finance, held a virtual roundtable with Indigenous business leaders from across Canada and highlighted the following initiatives:⁹
 - A federal budget investment of over \$18 billion, over the next five years, to support Indigenous communities, close gaps between Indigenous and non-Indigenous peoples, and advance reconciliation.
 - The recent launch of the Indigenous Growth Fund.
 - This \$150-million fund is a collaboration between the Business Development Bank of Canada (BDC) and the National Aboriginal Capital Corporation
 - It will provide a long-term source of capital to support the success of Indigenous businesses and entrepreneurs.
 - The federal government's COVID support programs:
 - The Indigenous Community Business Fund
 - The Indigenous businesses initiative
 - The Indigenous Community Support Fund
- Today, Deputy Prime Minister Freeland announced the Government of Canada is providing a further \$1 billion to support vaccine rollout campaigns across the country and helping Canadians receive their first and second doses as quickly as possible.¹⁰
 - This funding is being delivered through a one-time top-up to the Canada Health Transfer to help address the extreme pressures that COVID-19 has put on our health care systems.
 - This includes supports to engage Indigenous communities to advance vaccine rollout.
