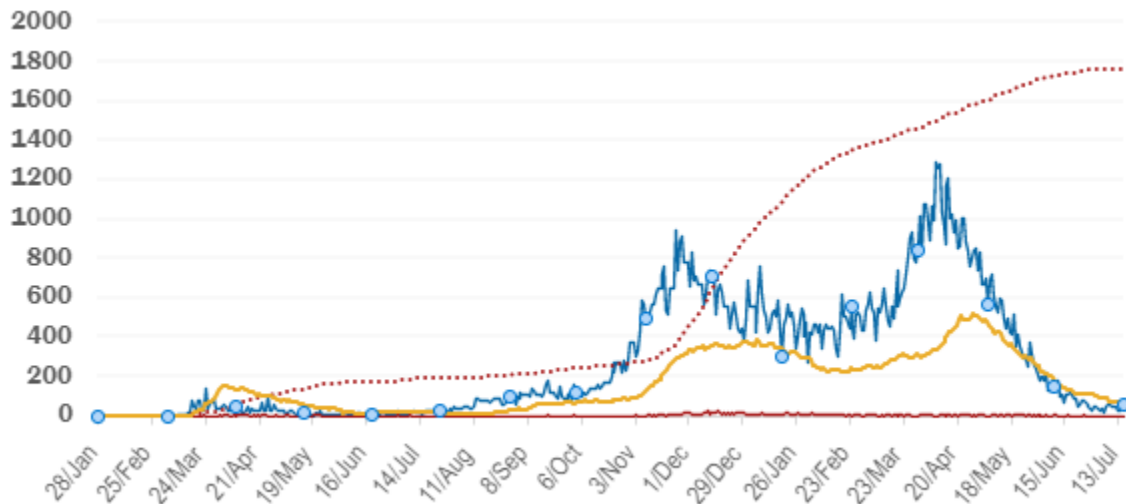

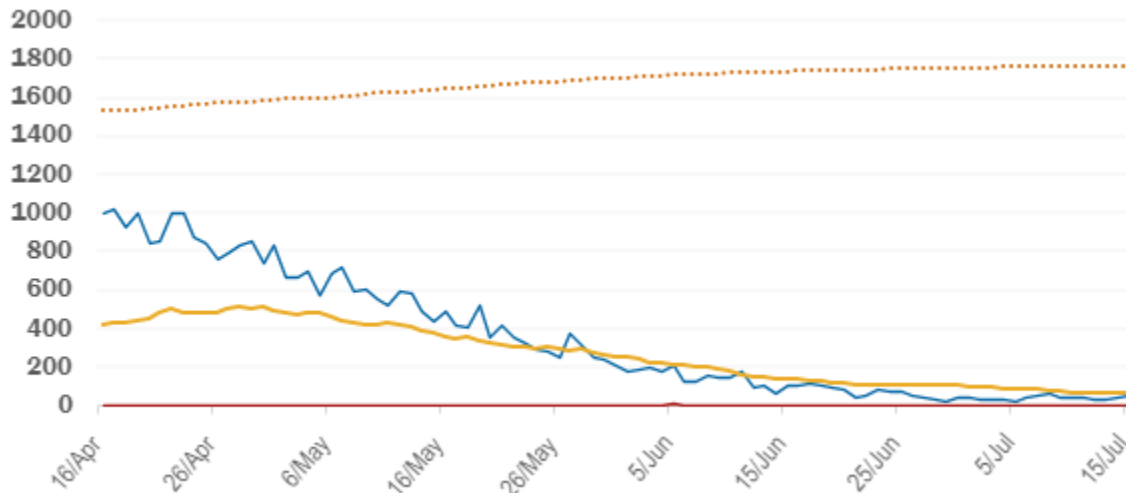

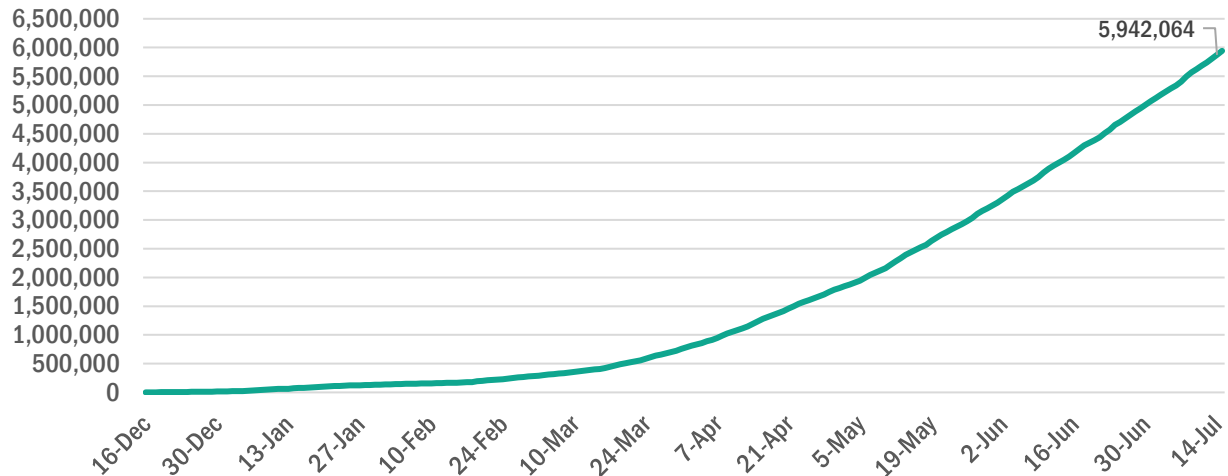

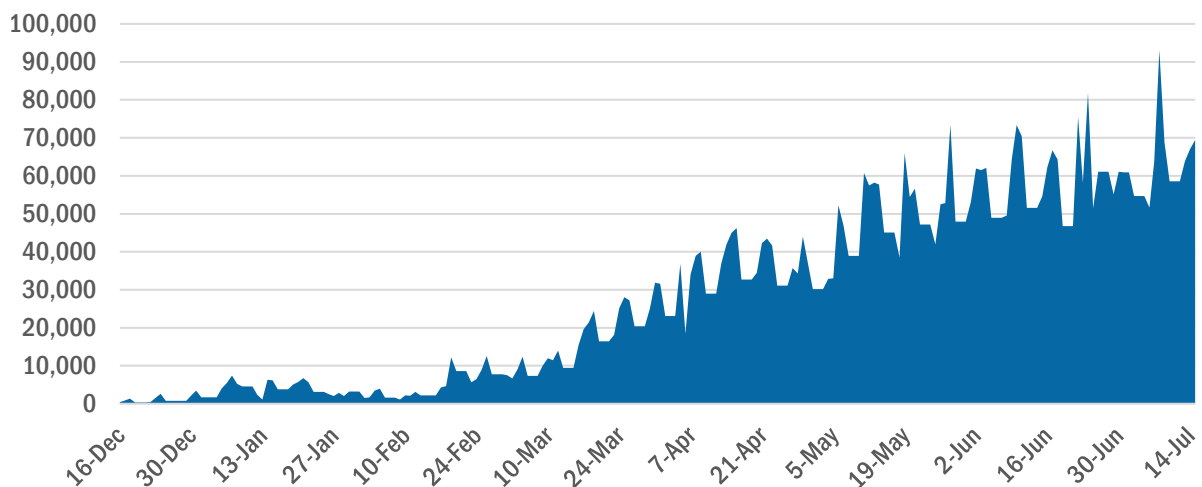

## **SIGNIFICANT UPDATES FROM THE GOVERNMENT OF CANADA**

- Today, Dr. Theresa Tam, the Deputy Chief Public Health Officer, issued a statement regarding the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic response in Canada. Highlights include the following:<sup>6</sup>
  - The prevalence of COVID-19 infection rates across the country remains at reduced levels.
  - On average, 85% fewer people are being admitted to hospital with COVID-19 daily than at the peak of the third wave, and an average of 9 deaths reported daily across the country.
  - In the coming weeks, public health officials will be rolling out targeted supports to ensure more Canadians are protected, as the current epidemiology in Canada shows the vast majority of cases, hospitalisations, and deaths are occurring in unvaccinated people.
  - “Asymptomatic and mild illness is still a feature, particularly in younger people but no age group is immune to severe illness due to COVID-19, and anyone can spread the illness to others, even if they aren't showing symptoms themselves.”
  - “This is why vaccination is important for every eligible age group. In particular, as infection rates are still highest among those under 40 years of age in Canada, increasing vaccine coverage in younger age groups can have a big impact on COVID-19 control across communities. This is also needed for the protection of those who are at high risk, including those who can't be vaccinated, such as young children.”
- Today, Omar Alghabra, Minister of Transport Canada, announced that, as of November 1, 2021, the prohibition of cruise ships in Canadian waters will no longer be in effect provided operators are able to fully comply with public health requirements:<sup>7</sup>
  - “We know that the maritime and tourism sectors have been hit hard by the global COVID-19 pandemic. As we reopen safely, we are already preparing for the upcoming cruise season that will help grow our economy.”
  - “As the outlook of the COVID-19 pandemic continues to improve, Canada looks forward to having a cruising season in 2022. The cruise ship industry, which represents more than \$4 billion annual input into the Canadian economy and directly and indirectly generates approximately 30,000 jobs, is an important part of Canada's domestic tourism sector.”
