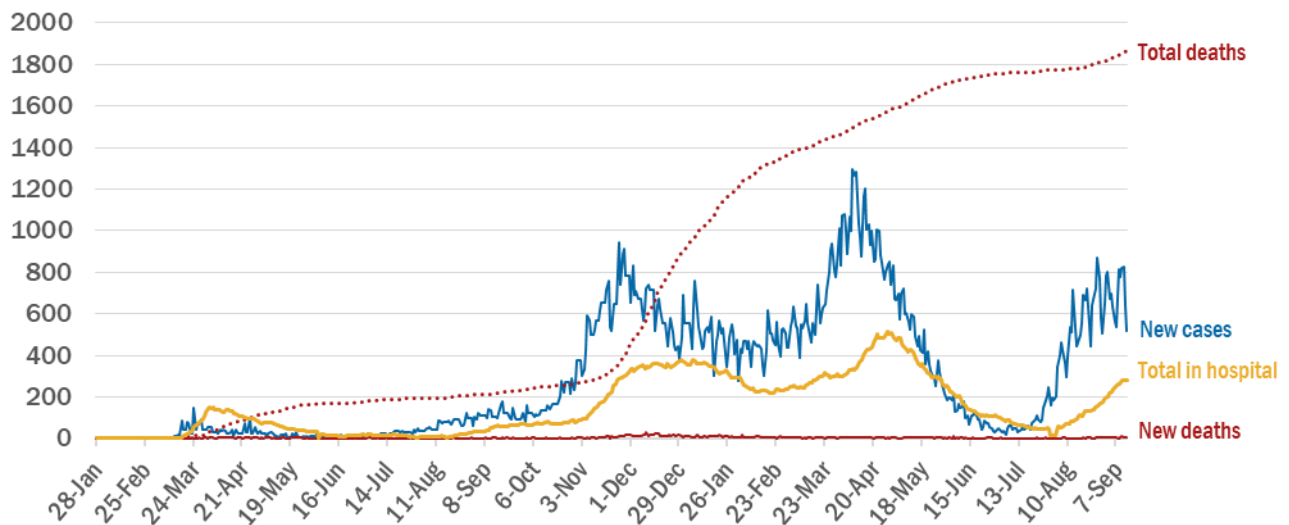

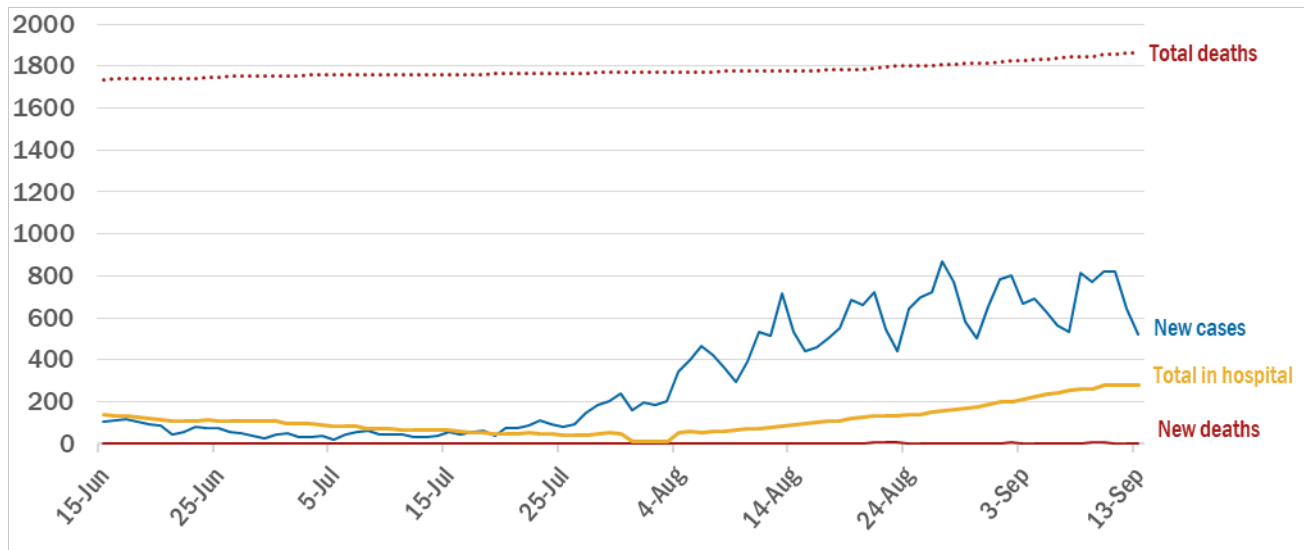

**COVID-19 CASES AND DEATHS IN BC – PAST THREE MONTHS**



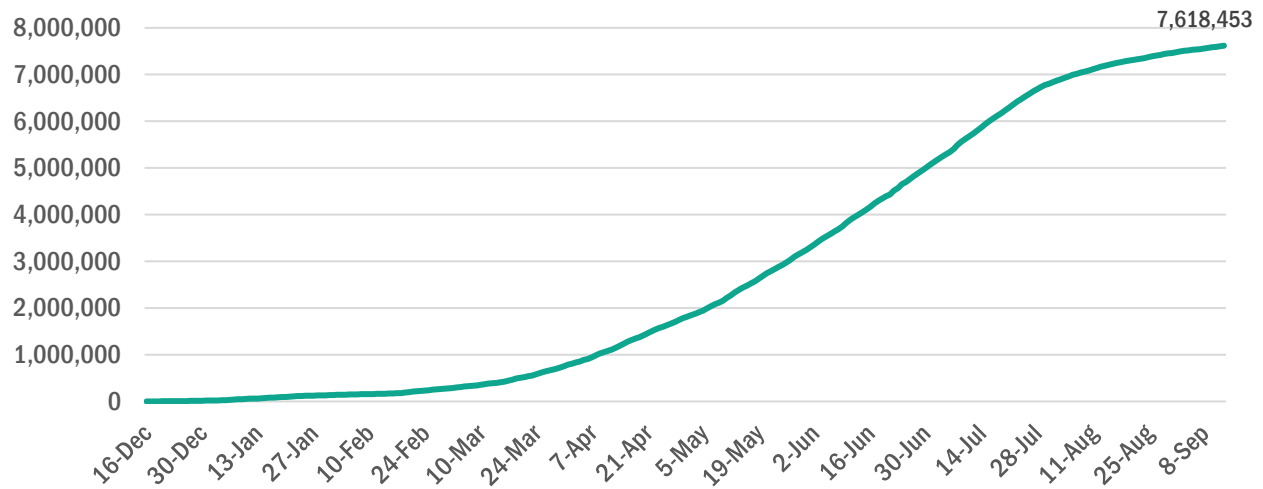

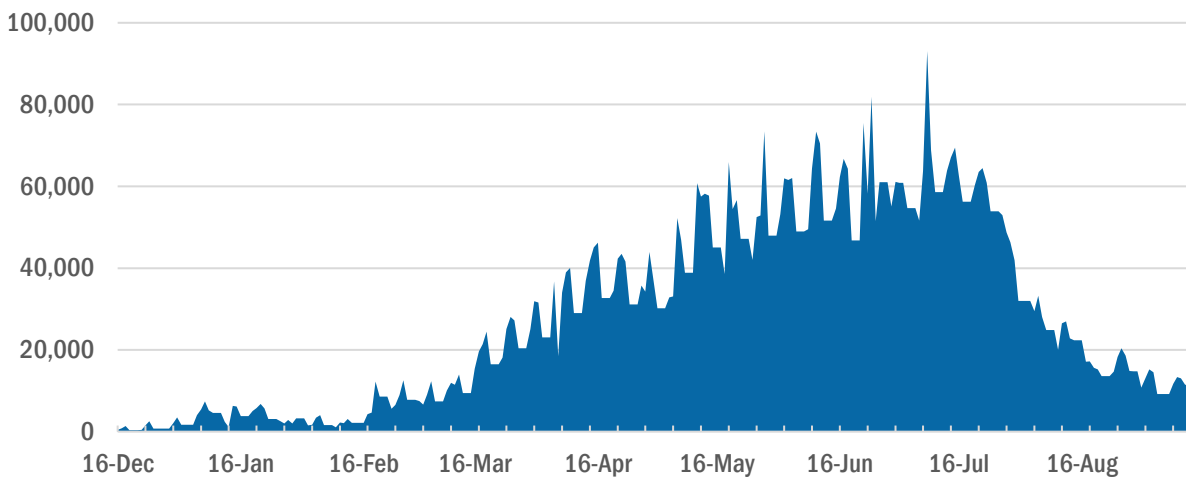

## SIGNIFICANT UPDATES IN BRITISH COLUMBIA

- In response to the new Public Health Order (PHO) given by B.C.'s Public Health Officer, starting today, Monday, September 13, the City of Terrace will require proof of vaccination (i.e. first shot received) with the BC Vaccine Card for certain discretionary activities in the Sportsplex, arenas, and Terrace & District Aquatic Centre.<sup>5</sup>
  - Proof of Vaccination is required for:
    - An organized event of more than 50 people, such as weddings held at Sportsplex banquet room, River Kings game, swim meets held at the pool. This means an organized group, not an occupancy of over 50.
    - Any physical activity that adults 22+ engage in within City of Terrace facilities, such as gym use, adult drop-in hockey, adult volleyball, adult pickleball, and fitness classes at Sportsplex.
  - Proof of Vaccination is not required for:
    - Children and youth activities of any kind for those under 22 years ("adult" is defined as 22+), as well as those directly supporting youth sport (coaches, volunteers, parents attending to children). This includes activities such as ringette, drop-in skates, and dance classes being held in City facilities.
    - General pool use, such as drop-in swims and length swims.
    - Services to those in need, such as warming/cooling centres in City recreation facilities.
    - Any and all outdoor recreation
  - "The details in the PHO have changed since the news of the BC Vaccine Card was first released. Municipalities, including ours, are working hard to interpret the orders and implement the changes, but we ask for patience as we fully implement procedures at our facilities."

- Today, the Ministry of Finance provided a statement regarding B.C.'s recovery from the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic.<sup>6</sup> Highlights include the following:
  - "Despite ongoing uncertainty from the COVID-19 pandemic, current forecasts show an increase in revenues and a reduction in the deficit for the 2021-22 fiscal year as British Columbia's strong vaccination rates are supporting a swift economic recovery in many sectors."
  - "The Province's first quarterly report saw an overall increase of \$6.2 billion in provincial revenues compared to Budget 2021. This is primarily due to gains in personal and corporate income tax revenues, natural resource revenues and federal funding largely related to B.C.'s pandemic response and recovery measures, as well as childcare."
  - "While the Province's fiscal outlook shows improvements from Budget 2021 based on the first quarter, there continues to be an elevated level of uncertainty in the revised forecast as

a result of the evolving pandemic in the province and globally. The forecast allowance will remain unchanged to provide continued prudence.”

- “As announced in Budget 2021, the Province allocated \$3.25 billion in Pandemic and Recovery Contingencies to address health and safety measures related to COVID-19, targeted supports for businesses and people most affected by the pandemic, and additional funding to build B.C.’s economic recovery. This funding is in addition to last year’s spending of \$10.1 billion to help support people, businesses and communities through the pandemic and into recovery.”

## **SIGNIFICANT UPDATES IN THE YUKON TERRITORY**

- Today, Dr. Catherine Elliott, acting Chief Medical Officer of Health, reported six new cases of COVID-19 in the territory from noon, Friday, September 10 to noon, Monday, September 13.<sup>7</sup>
  - Of these cases:
    - Five are Yukon residents and one is an out-of-territory resident which is not included in Yukon’s total case count
    - One case is in Whitehorse, three are in rural Yukon, and one is to be confirmed
- On September 11<sup>th</sup>, Dr. Catherine Elliott, acting Chief Medical Officer of Health, issued a COVID-19 public exposure notice for the following flight:<sup>8</sup>
  - Air North flight 4N510 on Tuesday, September 7, 2021, travelling between Kelowna, Vancouver, and Whitehorse with a departure time of 7:30 a.m.
  - Anyone on this flight is asked to self-monitor for symptoms for 14 days – through to September 21, 2021.
    - If symptoms appear self-isolate, remain at home, and arrange to get tested either by calling 867-393-3083 or booking a test online.
- On September 10<sup>th</sup>, Dr. Catherine Elliott, acting Chief Medical Officer of Health, reported five new cases of COVID-19 from noon, Wednesday, September 8 to noon, Friday, September 10 and issued a public exposure notice.<sup>9</sup>
  - Of the five new cases reported four are confirmed cases and one probable.
    - Of the confirmed cases, two are in Whitehorse and two are in a rural community.
  - The following public exposure notice was issued:
    - Air North flight 4N538 on Thursday, September 2, 2021, from Vancouver to Whitehorse with a departure time of 1:35 p.m.
    - Anyone on this flight needs to self-monitor for symptoms for 14 days, from September 2 to September 16, and arrange for testing if they develop any symptoms.
